'IN A HAMMOCK'

The Student Placement Office has referred Simon Fraser undergraduate students to many interesting jobs. One of the most financially and physically rewarding was revealed in a story told by John Henschel who is in second year education.

He was with a group of seven Simon Fraser students placed as geological assistants on a deep sea oil well seismic exploration off the west coast of Vancouver Island. In that area the sea is rarely smooth and most of the men were seasick, but when the job was completed in April, John stayed with the reduced crew to take one of the seismic ships through the Panama Canal to the Canadian east coast where seismic operations would be continued.

In John's own words, "The trip was a five-week voyage from one coast of Canada to the other. It included five stops en route for fuel, water or supplies. The first stops were San Pedro, California; and Acapulco, Mexico, then through the Panama Canal and to unique Panama City where everything is duty free. Jamaica, the Island in the Sun, was the main Caribbean stop, then to Norfolk, Virginia, the headquarters for the American Naval Fifth Fleet, and finally up the Atlantic coast to the citadel of Halifax."

He remained on the seismic crew until July 1st when he signed off and hitch-hiked back to Vancouver in six-and-a-half days. He will return to SFU for the fall semester, and if professors find him day-dreaming during lectures on cold winter days they can be assured that he is basking in the sun on an Acapulco beach or reclining in a hammock on a Caribbean Island.
