NEWS IN BRIEF

GRANT. Dr. Dennis G. Tuck, associate professor in the Chemistry Department, has received a \$14,000 research grant from Atomic Energy of Canada Ltd. The grant will be used to study diffusion in liquid metals. The results will be useful in relation to the use of such metals as cooling materials in nuclear reactors. Dr. W.H. Haffenden, post-doctoral research fellow at Simon Fraser, will work with Dr. Tuck on the project.
