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Discussion Topics: From the earliest representations of human experience, to contemporary digital cultures, literacy has been one of societys most powerful cultural tools. In its many forms, literacy has had far-reaching impact on the creation of knowledge, the organization of gender, race and class relations, and the formation of institutions. Formal education is one of the most important institutions through which literacy is transmitted and society is organized. This course explores the consequences of literacy for people and for the organization of education, from the earliest days of writing to the present. We will pay particular attention to the work of contemporary education institutions in this historical moment in which traditional print literacy and digital literacy cultures intersect.

Participants are encourages to contribute to class activities by suggesting and contributing relevant articles, visual and digital texts, video and audio material.
