GIFT TO LIBRARY

Mr. D.A. Baird, University Librarian, Simon Fraser University, announces a generous gift by the government of France of over 300 works by French authors.

The gift, valued at approximately \$700, features the works of modern French authors, including Jean Anouilh, Jean Paul Satre, Jean Giraudoux, André Gide and Albert Camus.

With the French Consul and President of this University, members of the Department of Modern Languages attended a luncheon given in honour of the French Government to award the gift of a fine collection of works by contemporary French authors to the Simon Fraser University Library.

HISTORY APPOINTMENTS

Dr. Allan B. Cunningham, Head, History Department at Simon Fraser University, announces new appointments for the Fall semester bringing the overall strength of the department up to 20 members.

The American branch of the department is augmented by the appointment of three historians of Canada, George Cook (B. Com., M.A., Dalhousie, D. Phil. Oxford), Douglas Cole (B.A. Whitman, M.A. George Washington, Ph.D. University of Washington) and George Emery (B.A. Queens) who is presently completing his doctoral studies at U.B.C. Cook's work concerns Canada's status and function in 20th century world affairs. Cole and Emery specialize in 19th century Canadian history. The work of all three professors will complement the History of the U.S.A. and Latin America, which the department already offers.

The department's European branch will be strengthened by seven new professors, including two specialists in Modern Russian history, Dr. Richard Debo (B.A., M.A., Ph. D. University of Nebraska) who comes from the University of Nebraska, and John Hutchinson (B.A. Toronto, M.A. U.B.C.) who is finishing a doctorate in London. Both have done research in the Soviet period, and Hutchinson has studied in Siberia as well as the archives in Hensinki.

In French history Charles Day (B.A. Stanford, M.A., Ph.D. Harvard) will be coming from a Californian College, while Charles Wrong (B.A., M.A. Oxford), whose chief interests are in the age of Louis XIV, will be crossing the continent from his present post at Amherst, Mass.

The remaining three appointments are those of Roger Infram Ellis who holds degrees from Oxford and London, Dr. Martin Kitchen (B.A. London, Ph. D. London), an historian of Nazi Germany, and David Huitson (B.A. Durham) who is at present doing research in the University of Leeds in the field of British Colonial and Administrative History.

The existing Colonial and Imperial branch of History at Simon Fraser University is to be strengthened mainly in the course of 1967 but at least one additional appointment is envisaged for the Fall. At present this branch is reinforced by a visiting professor from the University of Hull, Miss Ethel Drus (B.A., M.A. Capetown) who is well known for her work on South Africa at the time of the Boer War.

NATIONAL RESEARCH COUNCIL AWARDS

- Dr. B.D. Pate, Professor and Head of the Chemistry Department at Simon Fraser University, announces National Research Council awards totaling \$21,500 recently granted to members of his department.
- Dr. R.G. Korteling's \$4,000 award was made for the purpose of producing low mass products in high energy nuclear reactions.
- Dr. D. Meakin's award of \$3,500, the first instalment of a two-year grant was given for a study of the chemical constituents of plants, particularly compounds containing sulphur and selenium.
- Dr. A.G. Sherwood's award of \$4,000 will permit him to continue his research in the photochemistry of unsaturated organic molecules and free radicals. Professor Sherwood is presently at the Cookridge High Energy Radiation Research Centre, in Cookridge Hospital, Leeds, England.
- Dr. D. G. Tuck's award of \$10,000 was made for conducting research into the co-ordination chemistry of complexes and ${\rm d}^0$ and ${\rm d}^{10}$ metal ions.
