Discussion Topics: Course description:

This course is designed to introduce the student to First Nations issues in contemporary archaeology. It examines the awakening of internalist archaeology as a conceptual framework for imagining the past in the Aboriginal world. Topics to be covered include Aboriginal thought on archaeological methods and theory, the exhumation, public display and repatriation of human remains and sacred objects, and archaeology in the context of land claims. This is a Group IV Topical course.
