NEWS IN BRIEF

STUDENT AFFAIRS. Students, faculty and administrators have been appointed to a committee to study student affairs. Dr. Charles Hamilton, Director of University Affairs who heads the committee, says the study will be concerned with all non-academic student services. Other members are Mr. Arthur Weeks, an undergraduate student; Mr. Ian Spencer, a graduate student in History; Mr. D. P. Robertson, Registrar; Mr. Alan Smith, Executive Assistant to the President; Miss Lolita Wilson, Dean of Student Affairs; Dr. Charles Crawford and Prof. F. M. Frazer (Faculty of Arts), Dr. Arthur Elliott (Faculty of Education) and Dr. Konrad Colbow (Faculty of Science).

BARGAINS. Treasure Van, sponsored in the Theatre Foyer this week by the World University Service, is an exotic collection of handicrafts from more than 40 countries with goods ranging from the bizarre to the beautiful. RUSSIA 1917. Professor Richard Pipes, lecturer in the program arranged by the History Department to mark the 50th anniversary of the Russian Revolution, is Professor of History and Fellow of The Russian Research Centre at Harvard University. He has written widely on political thought and imperial policy. He is author of The Formation of the Soviet Union, Karamzin's Memoir on Ancient and Modern Russia and Social Democracy and the St. Petersburg Labor Movement, 1885-1897.
