Bearing witness to the transformative testimonies of residential school survivors

At Simon Fraser University's Vancouver campus on Thursday, Apr. 27, acclaimed radio journalist Shelagh Rogers, OC, will reflect on being an honorary witness for the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada.

Rogers will discuss the impact of hearing hundreds of residential school survivors speak at national and regional events. The real history of Canada was not taught to generations of Canadian school children—but Indigenous peoples lived it. What does reconciliation mean now that Canada knows the truth of their experience?

Rogers will be briefly available for one-on-one interviews after the event. SFU history professor Mary-Ellen Kelm, an Indigenous peoples expert, will also be at the event and can provide additional commentary.

According to the TRC, witnesses are called to be the keepers of history when an event of historic significance occurs. They are asked to store and care for the history they witness and most importantly, to share it with their own people when they return home.

"We all have a role to play as Canadians, but as a public post-secondary institution, we bear a special responsibility to lead intercultural dialogue and understanding about reconciliation beyond Canada 150," says Catherine Murray, associate dean of SFU's Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. "Shelagh Rogers shows us how to bear witness and grow in understanding."

Rogers, chancellor of the University of Victoria and long-time journalist, has traveled the length and breadth of this country, interviewing thousands of Canadians and collecting their stories.

In the last few years, she has committed herself to working towards reconciliation from coast to coast to coast. She plans to

devote herself to reconciliation for the rest of her life.

The talk is part of SFU's Department of History's yearlong lecture series, Canada 150: Confederation in Question.
