Discussion Topics: This course is a combined first and second year seminar required of all

students taking the MFA Program.

This seminar utilizes a series of readings and

presentations by students and guests to explore questions

relevant to contemporary artistic practice. Readings are divided

between texts which provide important theoretical foundations and

essays which consider specific issues pertinent to contemporary

cultural practice. Students will be required to write a significant

essay on a topic of their choice relevant to both the readings and

their individual practice. In-class presentations on readings and

work-in-progress will also be scheduled.

Through this class students should gain a better understanding of

the contemporary cultural context for their work. Students will be

asked to begin the class by researching both a historical and

contemporary picture of their \204discipline\211 with the goal of situating

their own practice in this context. Each student should choose one

historical and one contemporary artist whose work will form a

reference point for them throughout the semester.
