Discussion Topics: This course will explore one of the most prolific and influential national cinemas in the world. We will contrast the films of Ray and Sen, inspired by European neorealism but culturally specific in their subjects and settings, to the contemporary and decidedly anti-realist "Bollywood" musicals, which have had an international impact not only on diasporic communities but on Hollywood itself. We will pay special note to such as Lagaan, Mangal Pandey, and Paheli, which combine the several recent hybrid films concerns of the art film with the musical and visual extravagance of social Bollywoodís ëcinema of attractionsí. Film screenings will begin in Vancouver and continue during three weeks in Mumbai, the centre of contemporary Hindi cinema. There, in partnership with the new Whistling Woods International Institute for Film, Television and Media Arts, we will arrange screenings of recent films and meet screenwriters, composers and actors. Students will visit film studios in Mumbai and attend directors, guest lectures by Professor Narendra Panjwani of the University of Mumbai.

The course is to be taken in conjunction with two others, FPA 289: Foundations of Indian Art & Culture, and FPA 311: Art & Culture of Contemporary India, as part of our Field School in Art & Culture of Contemporary India.
