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Discussion Topics: From the Human Genome Project, blogs to biometric screening at the border, post-industrialized

societies are saturated with new technologies of information that change at an accelerated pace. Despite their apparent novelty, however, these technologies echo and rearticulate existing regimes of knowledge and social order, particularly in relation to race, gender, class and sexuality. What is new is, in fact, old in many ways.

In this course, we will take up core concerns and concepts in science and technology studies (STS), a multi and interdisciplinary field that has long grappled with questions of science, knowledge, power and subjectivity. We will specifically examine technologies that have transformed the way we understand social relations, truth and bodies, such as genetics, surveillance, health information, photojournalism, video games, blogging, online communities and clinical information. We will approach these topics and thematics from a critical standpoint, unraveling the relations of power and contextual complexities as well identifying spaces and practices of resistance and counterdiscourse.
