This course addresses the interface between semantics and phonology. In particular, it concerns the way prosodic features like intonation play a part in the interpretation of a sentence. First, the semantic/pragmatic range of meanings, attitudes, and discourse effects that prosody allows. We will look into the repertoire of sentence types as well as features such as attitude, emotion and degree of involvement of the speaker in the situation. Second, we will examine the prosodic means utilized in order to convey the above impressions on the communicative value of an utterance. Student participation will be encouraged and expected.
