NEWS IN BRIEF

PRESIDENT'S BALL. Students, faculty and staff are invited to attend Simon Fraser's event of the year -- the formal ball in honor of President P.D. McTaggart-Cowan at the Hotel Vancouver Ballroom Saturday, December 3 (7.30 p.m. to Midnight). The ball is being arranged by the Student Society with all proceeds going to the University student Bursary Fund. Dancing is to the music of the HMCS Discovery Band and there will be a buffet supper. KOERNER LECTURE SERIES. First of this season's series of Leon and Thea Koerner Foundation Lectures in Experimental Science will be held in Lecture Theatre C9200 this Thursday, November 24, at 8.15 p.m. The speaker is Dr. Gordon A. Riley, Director of the Institute of Oceanography, Dalhousie University. He will speak on non-living particulate organic matter in sea water and its biological significance. Dr. Riley, whose special areas of interest are ecology of plankton and chemical and physical oceanography, has made important contributions in a long term study on Long Island Sound oceanography. He carried out pioneer work on the formation of particulate organic matter from dissolved organic compounds in sea water -- of importance because it provides a potential food source for animals such as zooplankton and shell fish.

HUMANITIES PROGRAM. The Rev. Frank Thompson, lecturer in Systematic Theology, Bishop's College, Calcutta, and presently a visiting professor in religion at Simon Fraser, speaks on "Theology and Common Humanity" in Room 9002 on Thursday, November 24 at 8 p.m. This is the first meeting of the 1966-67 program of the Humanities Association of Simon Fraser and UBC. The association is known for its interesting and varied selection of speakers and the new season promises to be a lively one. Meetings will be held monthly at Simon Fraser. Admission is free.

SENATE AND STUDENTS. The Senate has set up a committee to examine the question of student representation on Senate and of opening its meetings to interested observers. The committee is chaired by Registrar D.P. Robertson and other members are Mr. Justice Angelo Branca, Dr. K.E. Rieckhoff and Prof. T.H. Brose.

SENATE ELECTIONS. Results of the election to Senate of four Faculty members have been announced. New Senate members are: Prof. David H. Berg, Philosophy; Dr. R.J.C. Harper, Behavioral Sciences; Prof. Gerald B. Sperling, P.S.A.; and Dr. Warren Williams, History.
