## NEWS IN BRIEF

ELECTED. Mark Collins, president of Smith Lithograph Co. Ltd., has been elected by Senate to the University Board of Governors. Mr. Collins, who joined the Simon Fraser University Senate in October, has had a long interest in university affairs and government. He has held a number of positions with UBC organizations. He was treasurer and president of the A. M. S. Students' Council, treasurer of the Convocation and president of the Commerce Graduate Association. He has been president of the Alumni Association and in 1960 was appointed to a three-year term on the UBC Senate.

MBA PROGRAM. The Senate of Simon Fraser University has approved in principle the establishment of a program for graduate study in business administration. The program will be presented by the Department of Economics and Commerce and will offer a degree designated as the Master of Business Administration. Plans for the program are still being drafted and full details will be announced at a later date. Dr. Parzival Copes, Head of the Department of Economics and Commerce, said that members of his department are involved in planning the MBA program with Dr. William J. Crissy, Visiting Professor who is Associate Dean of the Graduate School of Business Administration, University of Michigan, acting as consultant. Dr. Crissy introduced a similar program in the Detroit area.

PRESIDENT. Professor Lorne M. Kendall of the Department of Psychology has been elected President of the British Columbia Psychological Association for the coming year. He is already a member of the association's Board of Examiners. The B. C. P. A. is an affiliate of the Canadian Psychological Association, and represents the interests of psychologists within the province to the Provincial Government, and establishes procedures for professional certification. As President, one of Professor Kendall's more important duties during the coming year will be to seek the Provincial Government's approval for the association's Registration Bill.

TELEVISION. The Library Audio Visual Centre will shortly be acquiring television equipment to allow faculty to explore the many applications of TV in teaching situations. The equipment includes cameras, monitors, and video tape recorders. Technical and production assistance will be provided by the Centre. SCULPTURE. A cast bronze sculpture on display earlier this year in the Centennial Sculpture '67 exhibition in Vancouver has been presented by Rothmans of Pall Mall Canada Ltd. to the University. The sculpture, "Guardian Two", is the work of Mrs. Elza Mayhew of Victoria, and is one of six purchase awards by Rothmans from the Centennial Sculpture '67 exhibition. The presentation was made by Mr. David Broome of Rothmans and receiving the gift on behalf of the University were Chancellor Dr. Gordon Shrum, President Dr. P. D. McTaggart-Cowan and members of the Works of Art Committee.
