Discussion Topics: Ethnographic fieldworkers have reported games and sports of all manners from around the world since the founding of anthropology as an academic discipline in the nineteenth century. Moreover, individual anthropologists have in different places and times conducted detailed studies of specific indigenous games and forms of play, as well as of large-scale sporting events such as the modern Olympic games. These developments underpin the recent emergence of a vibrant and growing anthropology of sport.

This course will focus upon the social and cultural construction of games and sport in a broad range of ethnographic settings. It will also consider the distinctive theoretical, methodological, and substantive contributions that anthropology can make to the larger interdisciplinary field of sport studies.
