Selected Topics in the History of Sociological Thought

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Discussion Topics: This course covers the first one hundred years of sociological theorizing from around the 1830s to the 1940s. The classical tradition of sociological thought emerged in the writings of leading theorists of that period. Among these theorists are Karl Marx, Max Weber, Emile Durkheim. This course examines the earliest concepts, theories and methods of sociology found in the writings of these thinkers. Their critical engagement with what is often termed the Enlightenment of eighteen century largely shaped sociology as a discipline. Therefore, the course will also briefly examine the writings of Montesquieu and Rousseau, who are often regarded as forerunners of sociological theory. The course will also include a brief review of the intellectual premises of the Enlightenment as evident in the seventeenth century thought of Hobbes and Locke which constitute a point of departure in the emergence of sociological theory. Throughout the semester this course will provide a forum to rethink politics and address historical and global dimensions of social change by making connections to todays world and by exploring Karl Polanyi's The Great Transformation and Giovanni Arrighi's Adam Smith in Beijing.
