NEWS IN BRIEF

GRANTS. Research grants totalling \$40,300 have been awarded by the Defence Research Board to members of the Chemistry and Physics Departments. \$11,000 goes to Chemistry Head Dr. B. D. Pate and Dr. R. R. Haering, Head of Physics, receives \$10,000. Dr. K. E. Rieckhoff (Physics) receives \$7,000, Dr. John Walkley (Chemistry) \$4,300, Dr. Y. L. Chow (Chemistry) \$4,000 and Dr. Konrad Colbow (Physics) \$4,000.

CHINA. Prof. James B. Parsons, one of North America's leading authorities on China, is to join Simon Fraser. Prof. Parsons, who is associate professor of Far Eastern History and Culture at the University of California, Riverside, has accepted an appointment as Visiting Professor in the History Department for one year from Sept. 1. Prof. Parsons visited China on a Fulbright fellowship in the late 1940s and studied at the College of Chinese Studies and Yenching University, Peking. In the years since he has kept his Chinese experience and knowledge alive by research and study visits to the Far East.

VISITING ARCHITECT. Helmut Borchardt, well-known German architect, gives two lectures in AQ 3005 on Monday May 15 - at 12 noon he speaks on "Architecture and Society" and at 8 p. m. he addresses the B. C. Institute of Planners on "Future of the City."

HUMANITIES LIBRARIAN: The appointment of David E. Pownall as Head Humanities Librarian has been announced. Mr. Pownall graduated from the Indiana University Library School in 1957 and served for six years as the Humanities Librarian at Oregon State University Library. Since January, 1964, he has been Head of Reader Service at the State College of Iowa, Cedar Falls. He is also an accomplished musician, his academic background including a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Wisconsin (1950), a Master of Music degree from the University of Tulsa, Oklahoma (1953) and doctoral work in musicology at Indiana University. His appointment is effective August 1.

NEW POSITION. A former B. C. school principal has been appointed Secondary School Liaison Officer for Simon Fraser. He is Leonard G. Truscott and his appointment, the first of its kind in B. C., is effective immediately. Mr. Truscott's task will be to disseminate information about the University to school officials, secondary school students and interested public organizations. After war service with the R. C. A. F., Mr. Truscott joined the staff of Cranbrook Junior-Senior High School and was subsequently appointed principal. From 1960 to 1966 he was principal of Prince Rupert Senior Secondary School. He joined Simon Fraser in September, 1966, as an Associate within the Professional Foundations Centre.
