## NEWS IN BRIEF

SCHOLARSHIPS FROM MRS. HOGARTH. Mrs. D.M. Hogarth, whose generosity led to the building of the Madge Hogarth House Women's Residence, has established two \$250 scholarships for students at the University. The scholarships will be awarded annually to students proceeding through the Professional Development program for teachers. One scholarship will be awarded to a student who has completed Education 402 and who is proceeding to Education 403 in the next semester and the other will go to a student completing Education 403 and proceeding to Education 404 in the following semester. President P.D. McTaggart-Cowan says: "All of us at Simon Fraser are indebted to Mrs. Hogarth in so many ways it is virtually impossible to express our thanks adequately. The real thanks will be expressed through the years by the quality of the graduating students who have been encouraged by Mrs. Hogarth's scholarships and by the quality of the students who have had their education enhanced by the opportunity of living in Madge Hogarth House."

TOP PHYSICISTS MEET. The Simon Fraser University Department of Physics has been awarded an \$8,000 grant by the Nato Science Committee. The award will be used to conduct a two-week Advanced Summer Institute in Solid State Physics at Alta Lake, B. C. The 1967 Summer Institute will deal with the topic of electrons in metals and will be the first of a series of such summer institutes. Prof. A.B. Pippard, F.R.S., Cambridge University; Prof. R.G. Chambers, Bristol University; Prof. A.V. Gold, Iowa State University; and Dr. W.M. Walsh Jr., Bell Telephone Laboratories will be the distinguished lecturers at the Institute. About 40 scientists from all parts of the world will participate in the program. Proceedings of the conference, which is sponsored by the Canadian Association of Physicists, will be published annually in book form.



THE NEW -- AND THE OLD. Simon Fraser, the forward-thinking university, can now look into the past -- to be precise, 100,000 years into the past! Dr. Roy L. Carlson, assistant professor in anthropology, is unpacking crates of Stone Age handaxes and other tools which he unearthed in the Sudan last year for Simon Fraser's new archaeological laboratory. Dr. Carlson, who specializes in prehistorical archaeology, says the 10,000 artifacts are between 100,000 and 4,000 years old. He collected them while leading the University of Colorado's fourth Nubian expedition.

AND MORE OF THE NEW. The East side of the Academic Quadrangle will be fully operational this month. It contains offices for 133 faculty members, 10 tutorial classrooms to accommodate a total of 250 students an hour and five 100-seater lecture theatres.
