Discussion Topics: Description/Topics: This course covers the history and development of world cinema from 1950 until the present. Its approach is twofold: on the one hand, it will provide an historical survey of the most significant trends and movements within cinema during the period, covering the development and dramatic transformation of the Hollywood studio system and the emergence of independent cinema in the U.S.A; the emergence of "new waves" across Europe and in Asia; the rise of "Third World" cinemas in Africa, Latin America and Asia; and the variations of avant-garde and experimental cinemas in Europe and the USA. On the other hand, the course will provide an introduction to the interpretation of cinema and the various vocabularies and methods with which one can explore the aesthetic function of cinema.
