NEWS IN BRIEF

NEW DEAN.

President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan has announced the appointment of Prof. John W. Matthews as Dean of Arts. Prof. Matthews, an associate professor in the Department of Economics and Commerce, joined the University in July, 1965. His appointment continues the University experiment of rotating deans, with Prof. Matthews continuing his association within the Department of Economics and Commerce. Born in Croydon, England, Prof. Matthews graduated with B.Sc. (Econ.) from London University in 1957 and was elected a Fellow of the English Institute of Chartered Accountants. In 1958 he joined the faculty of the University of Hong Kong and was there until joining Simon Fraser. In Hong Kong he was the U.K. representative to the United Nations Association. His book "Accounting Theory and Method: A Modern Introduction" was published in 1964.

INTERNATIONAL HONOR.

Dr. Gulzari L. Malli of the Simon Fraser Chemistry Department has been honored by an invitation to participate in an international summer school organized by N. A. T. O. and the French Atomic Energy Commission in Frascati, Italy, July 3 to 15. The summer school deals with "Correlation Effects in Atoms and Molecules" and only leading workers in the world in this research area are to participate. Dr. Malli, whose expenses will be covered by the sponsors, will present a paper at the school.

WATER RESOURCES.

President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan leaves Vancouver today (Monday) to attend the Congress of Canadian Engineers in Montreal. Dr. McTaggart-Cowan, who was Director of the Meteorological Service of Canada before joining Simon Fraser, will chair a special session on water resources and climate control in Canada. He says: "This is an area of concern to all in North America. Canada is the richest nation on earth in terms of fresh water resources but the development of plans to optimize our use of water and to prevent pollution constitutes two of the major engineering challenges in the next decade."
