NEWS IN BRIEF

LIBRARY. The Library has recently purchased a collection of 1,300 volumes relating to German East Africa. The books were formerly in the library of Mr. S. F. Hassan, a lawyer of Mombasa. They include accounts of expeditions, memoirs of settlers and officials, and governmental reports, covering essentially the period 1860 to 1920. Material in the collection covers a wide range of topics and will be found useful to the historian, political scientist, anthropologist, biologist and linguist interested in east Africa.

APPOINTMENT. Brian M. M. Carpendale -- war-time guerrilla, Cambridge University graduate, engineer, free-lance management consultant, lecturer and writer, is joining Simon Fraser University as an associate professor. Prof. Carpendale, whose appointment is effective July I, will contribute to the teaching program of the Communications Centre and supervise research in communications. He was with the Centre last semester as visiting University lecturer in communications. Prof. Carpendale received the Croix de Guerre with gold star for operations behind enemy lines while serving as captain in a British parachutist guerrilla regiment. After the war he graduated with honors in mechanical sciences from Kings College, Cambridge, in 1950 and received his M.A. in 1954. Following several years in engineering and management in Britain, he joined the University of Toronto in 1957 as assistant professor in the Department of Mechanical Engineering.

POET. Milton Acorn, who reads his poetry at 12.45 p.m. on Thursday, April 6, in the SFU Theatre, describes himself as "a carpenter, a socialist, and a poet." His "In Love and Anger" was published in Montreal in 1956. Two of his works "Against the League of Liars" and "The Brain's the Target." were published in 1959. In 1962, his volume, "Jawbreakers" appeared, and next month Very Stone Press in Vancouver will publish his Readings from the Vancouver Book of the Living. Acorn's reading is the 17th and final event in this semester's poetry series at SFU.

NEWS FROM ABROAD. Professor Jorge Garcia of the Department of Modern Languages has been delivering guest lectures in Computational Linquistics at the National School of Linguistic Research in Madrid. His activities involve directing the transcription and coding of early Spanish literary masterpieces in the Spanish Research Council's Computing Centre.
