NEWS IN BRIEF

PRESIDENT'S COMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITY HOUSING. A committee has been formed to look into and make recommendations on the nature and availability of housing facilities for SFU faculty, staff and students. A study of one university's housing needs will be conducted in the near future. Committee members would appreciate any comments or suggestions as to housing needs and any other matters generally connected with residences both on and off the campus. Please send these to Dr. J. Cairns (Dean of Science office).

KOERNER FOUNDATION LECTURES. A lecture in this series will be given by Prof. Anton B. Burg (Chemistry Dept., University of Southern California) in Room C9200 on Wednesday, Feb. 1 at 8.15 p.m. The title is "Trends in Inorganic Chemistry." Prof. Burg is a man with broad chemical interests, a master of the uses of vacuum technique and well known at the restrum of leading American and European scientific conventions. His own penetrating research endeavours cover such diverse areas as the hydrides of non-metals, fluorine compounds, organophosphorus compounds, addition compounds and inorganic polymers.

It was established by trainees of Haney Correctional Institution in memory of Correctional Officer Burton Baskerville who fell to his death from Burnaby Mountain.
