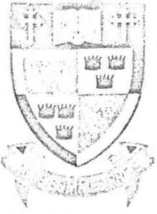

CANADA COUNCIL GRANT

3. Simon Fraser University has been awarded \$13,000 by the Canada Council for the purchase of library research materials; \$5,000 for African Studies and \$8,000 for South East Asian Studies, announced President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan.

The grants will assist in developing areas of study that the University in its library and departmental policy has recognized to be important and will also be of interest to a large number of the staff with varying interests. Emerging nations, new languages, development of a cash economy, and experiments in democracy and one party systems are subjects of special academic interest and also of practical importance to North America and Europe.

Some of the faculty working in these developing areas of study are T. Bottomore, A.H. Somjee, D. Bettison and R. Wyllie in the Political Science, Sociology, and Anthropology Department; B. Newton in the Department of Modern Languages; P. Stiggar in the Department of History.

Contemporary Africa is of particular interest to the History Department and Professor Stiggar has spent seven years in Tanganyika during the years 1958-65; he also visited other areas of East, Central and South Africa. In the Political Science, Sociology, and Anthropology Department, Professor Bettison previously worked in South and Central Africa, and recently has been doing extensive research on New Guinea; his chief interest is now in South East Asia. Professor Somjee is a recognized authority on Indian politics and has published a number of articles and books on the development of political parties and elections in independent India. In West Africa, R. Wyllie has done research, and in addition, taught at the University of Ghana.

"It gives me great pleasure to see this recognition by the Canada Council of the work that we are doing in these areas," said President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan.

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
