## NEWS IN BRIEF

BURSARIES. Details have been announced of a Permanent Bursary Endowment Plan to help students in financial need. President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan says: "Simon Fraser's very youth brings with it problems that are not shared by older universities which enjoy the support of large, long-established alumni. One of the most disturbing problems concerns the measure of support we can give to students in need of financial assistance. It is to help fill this need that we have established our Permanent Bursary Endowment Fund." Minimum endowments of \$1,000 can be purchased through the plan. Monies in the endowment plan will not be spent, but will be invested with the interest yield providing bursaries to students in need. (At five per cent simple interest the first ten years of a \$1,000 endowment will produce a minimum of \$500 for student bursaries. Endowments, which can be purchased outright or over a period of up to ten years may be registered in honor or in memory of a relative or friend. General chairman of the plan is Mr. A.O. Kaplan, President of National Holdings Ltd.

Mr. C. H. McLean and Mr. M. M. Waterman are honorary chairmen.
