Discussion Topics: This course, open to all undergraduates, is intended to provide students who have a general interest in educational studies an opportunity to critically examine a variety of educational issues from the perspective of analytic philosophy. A central concern of the course is to elucidate the nature of education as distinct from related concepts such as training and socialisation, and to argue that education is a uniquely human phenomenon. Other concepts considered include mind, knowledge and emotion. As its title indicates, the course is equally concerned with introducing the business of philosophical analysis to students.

There are no prerequisites for the course. It is, however, essential that all who wish to take the course, including those on a wait list, are present for the first introductory class.

Topics include: What is it to be Human? The Concept of Education. The Nature of Knowledge. Indoctrination. Rationality and Autonomy. Morality. Religion. Needs, Wants and Interests. Creativity. Culture. The Arts.
