NEWS IN BRIEF

TRAIL. A bronze plaque commemorating the early explorers and trail builders of British Columbia will be unveiled on the roadside East of the President's Residence Friday, September 15 at 3 p.m. The plaque will serve as a temporary marker for the Centennial Trail running from the University to Manning Park. The trail is the centennial project of the Canadian Youth Hostels Association. The Hon. W. K. Kiernan, Minister of Recreation and Conservation, will open the Trail at the September 15 ceremony.

BLOOD. The First Tradition Trophy, put up by Simon Fraser students in a challenge to other universities for the highest blood drive turnout, has been won by Mount Allison University, Sackville, New Brunswick. Simon Fraser came second in the drive with the University of Waterloo in third place. Simon Fraser student Csaba Hajdu, convener of the contest, says: "We are hoping it will help Red Cross in its blood drives across the country. We are naturally disappointed Simon Fraser didn't win the trophy first time out, but I do not think it will be long before the trophy returns. We already hold the provincial record for donating blood in a single day. On the first day of our drive last fall our students gave 703 pints -- and this record still stands."
