SENATE. Result of the ballot to elect three student representatives to the University Senate has been announced. Eleven students ran as candidates and a total of 1,384 voted. Result of faculty elections to Senate has also been announced. Dr. Selma Wasserman has been elected by Education, Prof. Ed Gibson (Arts) and Dr. John Walkley (Science). Joint faculty representatives to Senate are Prof. Ron Baker, Dr. D. G. Tuck and Prof. Michael A. Lebowitz.

PREMIERE. The world premiere of a work by Simon Fraser composer R. Murray Schafer will be heard on Sunday, June 11, at 8.15 p. m. in the North Vancouver Centennial Theatre. Simon Streatfeild will conduct the Vancouver Youth Orchestra (Senior Division) and the West Vancouver Secondary School Choir (Donald Forbes, director) in the first performance of Threnody for tape, speakers, chorus and orchestra. The text is drawn from young people's reminiscences of the atomic bomb on Nagasaki, 1945. Tickets for this concert, which will also include works by Telemann, Shostakovich, Tchaikovsky and Henri Tomasi, will be on sale at the door. Adults \$1.50 Students 75¢

* Two sculptures by Iain Baxter -- a 70foot pool flower and a white cloud -- went on display last week as part of an open air exhibit of Canadian Sculpture presented by the National Gallery of Canada as part of its Centennial program. Sculpture '67 will be on display in front of the Toronto City Hall through September 5, 1967.

* R. Murray Schafer, University Resident in Music, presents a paper on "The Future of Music in Canada" to the Royal Society in Ottawa on June 7.

* Jack Behrens, University Resident in Music, and Michael Bawtree, University Resident in Theatre, represent Simon Fraser at a conference on the Arts in the University, sponsored by Canada Council and the Association of Colleges and Universities of Canada, at Queen's University June 6-9.

* Phyllis Mailing Schafer, director of the Simon Fraser choir, who was heard last week in the second lunch-hour concert of the summer series, will perform her husband's Minnelieder for Mezzo-Soprano and Woodwind Quintet at the Canadian Pavillion at Expo '67 on Wednesday, June 7. Her recording of this work with the Toronto Woodwind Quintet has been released on Volume VI of the RCA Victor Ltd. - CBC International Service Music and Musicians of Canada Centennial Edition of seventeen records.

RADIO. Dr. Roy Carlson of the PSA Department will deliver the first of a series of four talks on archeology on Sunday, June 11, at 10.15 p. m. on CBC radio. The subject of his first talk will be a definition of archeology and its aims and goals with particular reference to British Columbia. On June 18, he will speak on the Old World origins of man and his culture and the spread of man to the New World. On June 25, he will speak on the pre-history of the New World and the ancestors of the North American Indian. In his final talk, on July 2, he will discuss current research at Skeena, Gabriola Island and the Arrow Lakes.
