Discussion Topics: Through narrative inquiry and traditional study, students develop a deep understanding of and appreciation for and ability to access composition as an artistic experience and a teachable craft which promotes self-understanding and influences how others appraise one's worth.

Overview

I. Purpose: This course has one clear focus: Helping you to discover your subject.

Thats a big job. It means finding that one thing that you care about and want to learn more about. There is a mystery to be unraveled, something to be explored, discovered, something about you and something about life.

II. Tools: This course will provide a few tools to help you along your way. It is my job to provide those tools. It is your job to use them.

The main tool I will offer is a system that will help you to work through the creative process in a way that invites revision and promotes satisfying product or performance.

The system contains four basic elements: Discovering a subject Sensing an audience Searching for specifics Creating a design.

III. Opportunities: This course will provide as many opportunities as I can think of and we have time for to enable you to walk through the doors of attraction to engagement, at least for awhile and maybe a lifetime. Those opportunities will be writing exercises, reading and dialoging about articles, practicing your art, taking part in a fake conference.

IV. Responsibilities: You will be expected to do the following:

Attend classes prepared to share you ideas, work, to dialogue with respect and attention. This will mean you read many of the readings, complete many of the writing tasks, edit one anothers work in a timely fashion. The energy of the course will depend upon your doing that. Explore the topics I offer, trying them on for size, as you do two things:

o Learn the process

o Discover your subject.

Grading: Select the subject you want to explore on a personal level and begin to write narratives until you feel you have said something real something that is true and something that you hadnt really known before you began to write. (25%)

Discover the joy of doing library research. Spend a week in the library searching for data on a new subject for you. Come to the learning with a beginners mind. Present your learning to the class via power point. (25%)

Take part in a conference on education in the arts. You will present a ten minute discussion paper on the topic of your choice. You may choose to collaborate and present a forum on one subject. The class will dialogue after each presentation. It is your chance to present yourself as a professional. (25%)

Create something that was inspired by the work you have done in this course. I have no idea what it will be. A dance? A painting? A childrens book? A monologue? A narrative? A song? A photograph? A sculpture? A necklace? A hat? A collage? A new culinary masterpiece? (25%)
