

LECTURER IN THEATRE ARTS. John Juliani, who joined Simon Fraser University as an Associate in Drama, has been appointed University Lecturer in Theatre Arts. Mr. Juliani has had considerable acting and directing experience, appearing in productions at the Stratford Festival and the Vancouver Playhouse and directing in Montreal and Stratford. His knowledge of French and Italian, combined with his natural and professional stage sense, have made his play translations both accurate andactable. In his new duties he will co-ordinate specified activities in the Theatre, including the production and direction of plays and he will explore the possibilities of integrating the Communications Centre with the community in the form of playwright workshops, seminars and acting workshops.

GABRIEL FIELDING HERE JANUARY 19. British novelist Gabriel Fielding, who won the W. H. Smith Award for the most important contribution to English literature in 1962-63, will lecture in the Theatre at 12.30 p.m. Thursday, January 19. He will lecture on "The Class Structure in the Modern British Novel." Gabriel Fielding -- pseudonym of Dr. Alan G. Barnsley of Maidstone, England -- was in medical practice for 21 years. He gave up medicine for full-time writing and is presently Artist in Residence at Washington State University. Mr. Fielding, reputedly descended on his mother's side from the 18th Century novelist Henry Fielding, began his career as a novelist in 1954 with the book "Brotherly Love". In 1956 he published "In the Time of Greenbloom"; 1958, "Eight Days"; 1960, "Through Streets Broad and Narrow"; 1962, "The Birthday King"; 1966, "Gentlemen in Their Season". He is currently at work on the seventh novel.

GEOGRAPHY APPOINTMENT. Professor A. MacPherson, Head of Geography, has announced the appointment of MARTYN C. KELLMAN as assistant professor. The appointment is effective from April 1. Mr. Kellman, who graduated from McGill and obtained his Master's degree at the University of Wisconsin, is presently a research scholar and Ph. D. candidate at the Australian National University, Canberra. As part of his biogeographical studies he has carried out extensive research in secondary vegetation in the Mt. Apo District of Mindanao.

UNIVERSITY TOURS. Hundreds of tourists visited Simon Fraser University during the Christmas holiday week, with nearly 1,000 going on tours conducted by the Student Guide Service. The Guide Service will continue its program of hourly tours on Saturdays and Sundays in the Spring Semester, but there will be no guided tours on weekdays during this period.

PSYCHOLOGY APPOINTMENT. Dr. Judith G. ALBERT has been appointed visiting assistant professor of Psychology for the Spring Semester. Mrs. Albert, who was awarded her Master's and Ph. D. degrees at McGill, was formerly a lecturer at the University of Michigan. At Simon Fraser she will teach the laboratory course in perception (Psychology 230), part of the Graduate Seminar in Contemporary Problems (Psychology 800), supervise undergraduate research and help supervise some graduate students.

NATIONAL DIVING CHAMPIONSHIPS. Canada's top divers will be competing at Simon Fraser Saturday and Sunday, January 7 and 8, in the 1967 Canadian Indoor Open Diving Championships. Preliminaries will be at 2 p.m. on both days and the finals 7.30 p.m. Saturday and 6 p.m. Sunday. Admission is by an all-session ticket (\$3.50 from Paul Savage, Athletic Department) or at the door -- 50¢ for the preliminaries and 75¢, \$1 and \$1.50 for the finals.
