## NEWS IN BRIEF

**CONVOCAATION.** Congratulations go to Simon Fraser's first graduates. Receiving their degrees at tomorrow's (Saturday, May 20) ceremonies are: Gerrit Hofstra (Ph. D.), William N. Hansen, Geoffrey Mercer and Michael J. Mulkay (M. A.), Choy Leong Hew, Robert G. Thompson, Weng Yek Lee and Donald G. Wallen (M. Sc.) and Morry Appelle, Harvey R. S. Bell, William B. Martin and Philip H. Waddell (B. A.)

Receiving Honorary Degrees will be Mrs. D. M. Hogarth, Dr. H. Marshall McLuhan and Dr. Leon J. Koerner. Dr. McLuhan will give the Convocation Address.

The Convocation starts at 2 p. m. on The Mall -- and, with or without tickets, all members of the University Community are invited to attend.



GRANTS. Recent awards to faculty and graduate students from the Canada Council, National Research Council and other organizations amount to nearly \$50,000. Canadian Council awards have been made to the following: Prof. Evelyn J. Harden (Modern Languages), \$4,100 in support of her research on Russian dramatist Griboedov. Prof. G. P. F. Steed (Geography), \$1,250, to continue research on location problems of manufacturing and associated regional development. Prof. Edgar F. Harden (English), \$1,120 for a research project on American characters in British fiction, 1800-1860. Prof. John Baird (History), \$1,075 for historical research in Ireland, England and Spain on 17th and 18th Century Spain. Prof. Thomas H. Brose (PSA), \$1,500 for his research on Mexican politics. Dr. Sydney Coontz (Economics and Commerce), \$984 for research for a book tentatively entitled "A Re-evaluation of Imperialism." National Research Council grants totalling \$24,000 go to Dr. Kenneth N. Burstein (Psychology) to study classical conditioning and the phenomena of generalization and spontaneous recovery. The Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation has granted a \$3,000 fellowship to graduate student Ian Thomas Joyce (Geography) for investigations into Vancouver's "local areas" which are identified on the basis of selected socio-economic criteria. Dr. John Leggett (PSA) receives \$2,775 from the Social Science Research Council for his study of "liberation from racial traditionalism," based on fair-housing votes in California. Dr. Harold Weinberg (Psychology) receives two grants -- \$4,500 from the Medical Research Centre and \$3,000 from the National Research Council for research into the relationship between brain stimulation and changes in behavior.

UNVEILING. A bronze plaque in honor of Chancellor Gordon M. Shrum was unveiled in the University Board Room Wednesday by President Rudolf Sallinger of the Federal Economic Chamber of Austria. The plaque, containing a bronze relief in the likeness of the Chancellor, was presented to the University by Austrian Consul General John Hecht. A plaque carrying a likeness of the head of explorer Simon Fraser was unveiled at the same time. Artist of the plaques was Prof. Hanisch-Consée, an Austrian who has done similar work for two Popes, de Valera, Churchill and other men of history.

VICTORIA DAY. Lectures, laboratories and tutorials are cancelled and offices and library closed on Monday, May 22, for the Victoria Day holiday.

GIFT. A topographical map showing the routes of early B.C. explorers, including Simon Fraser, can be seen in the Theatre Foyer. The map is the Centennial project of the Men's Canadian Club of Vancouver and has been presented to the University. Club members shared personally in the project with the stipulation that no one member give more than \$5 -- and more than 300 members contributed. Members of the Club executive were on campus on Wednesday for Club President A. W. S. Mortifee to make the presentation to University President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan.
