NEWS IN BRIEF

CUSO. Sixty delegates from Simon Fraser, UBC, University of Victoria, Notre Dame, BCIT, University of Alberta and University of Calgary will attend the opening meeting of the 2-day CUSO Regional Conference on Friday evening, September 29, at Simon Fraser University. Speakers will be Frank Bogdasovich and Hugh Christie. The SFU student CUSO committee has also arranged a public lecture by economist Laughlin Currie at 12.30 p.m. on Friday. The 2-day meeting will move to UBC on Saturday, September 30, for an all-day working session in International House.

SPACE. Four additional trailers are to be brought to the campus to help ease accommodation problems. They will bring the number of Arts trailers to six and will be located East of the Academic Quadrangle, providing tutorial rooms for students and allowing T.A.s to use fifth floor A.Q. rooms for offices. The new trailers arrive in two weeks. Eight other trailers, located west of the Science Complex, are being used by the Science Faculty.

PRIZE. A CBC television film study of the architecture of Simon Fraser University was awarded the Czechoslovak Television Prize (Le prix de la télévision tchécoslovaque) at the recent Second International Festival of Architectural Films in Prague. The award was made "for the production and direction by Vincent Tovell and the photography of Doug Mackay." The half-hour film, part of a four-program series "A Sense of Place" was seen on the CBC-TV network in October of 1966. It examined the Simon Fraser complex through the eyes of the principal architects, the Vancouver firm of Erickson-Massey. The prize was the only award at the Prague Festival given specifically for a television film. The international adjudicating panel comprised experts from Czechoslovakia, Britain, France, the Soviet Union and Brazil.
