NEWS IN BRIEF

PRESIDENT'S BALL. The formal ball in honor of President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan promises to be not only a gala evening for Simon Fraser faculty, students and staff but one of Vancouver's outstanding events of the year. The ball, featuring the music of the HMCS Discovery Band, starts at 7.30 p.m. and ends at midnight. Tickets at \$10 a couple may be obtained from the Student Council Office and the Bursar's Office.

SECOND KOERNER LECTURE. Dr. C. S. Holling of the Canada Department of Forestry and Rural Development, Victoria, is the second speaker in the Leon and Thea Koerner Foundation Lectures in Experimental Science in Lecture Theatre 9200 Thursday, December 1 at 8.15 p.m. He lectures on "The Strategy of Building Models of Complex Ecological Systems." Dr. Holling has been with the Canada Department of Forestry since 1954. His research has concentrated on processes that affect animal populations with the aim of developing an integrated, precise and realistic view of population events that has theoretical and practical consequences. One of his recent publications has just received the George Mercer Award of the Ecological Society of America "for an outstanding paper in the field of Ecology during the year 1965".

BILL SELLERS MEMORIAL FUND. Donations to the fund set up as a memorial to Dr. William H. Sellers are being received at the Bursar's office and English Dept. (Rm. 6129). Dr. Sellers, associate professor of English, died suddenly in Vancouver General Hospital last week at the age of 39. He was one of the original members of the Simon Fraser English Department. Prof. Ron Baker, Head of English, said: "Dr. Sellers was one of the best lecturers and teachers in the University. Popular with students and colleagues he will be missed by us all."

MILTON SCHOLAR HERE. Dr. Kester Svendsen, a leading Milton scholar and head of the English Department, University of Oregon, speaks on "Alternatives in Paradise Lost" in the Theatre on Thursday, December 8 at 4.30 p.m. Dr. Svendsen, who has held an American Council of Learned Societies Fellowship, a Guggenheim Fellowship, a Folger Library Fellowship and a Huntington Library Fellowship, is author of "Milton and Science" and more than 50 articles and reviews on Milton. For the past three years, he has conducted "The Poet's Eye," a poetry series televised bi-weekly from the University of Oregon. The series was awarded first place in a recent competition sponsored by the San Francisco State College Radio-Television Guild for a program called "The Eternal Sea."

COMPOSER ON TELEVISION. R. Murray Schafer, University Lecturer in Music and a member of the Centre for Communications and the Arts, will be featured on the CBUT (Channel 2) program, "Umbrella," at 5 p.m. on Sunday, December 4. Mr. Schafer is currently in Montreal completing an electronic music score commissioned for films to be shown at the "Man and Colour" Pavilion at EXPO 67.
