This course brings a critical perspective to the traditions and applications of qualitative research in Sociology and Anthropology. After exploring the epistemological foundations underlying choices in research methodologies and related fieldwork methods, you will gain practical experience in a range of tools for producing and evaluating qualitative research and ethnographic studies. This course will engage with research motivations, ethics, and methodological choices while examining the issues of representation, voice, reflexivity and researcher positioning. This course will emphasize ethnographic readings, class discussions and research exercises to familiarize you with research ethics and research design, as well as a variety of fieldwork methods including participant observation, interviewing, testimony and oral history, focus groups, analysis of texts and materials, visual methods, data analysis, and writing up and presenting qualitative research. You will also be encouraged to apply the methods, concepts and tools of the course in an ongoing project in which you will design and carry out a mini-ethnography.
