Discussion Topics: The objectives of this course are to introduce students to a selection of ideas and issues relevant to education in general as well as what it means to be a teaching professional in Canada today. Units will centre on fundamental concepts such as self-awareness and self-education; historical influences of Western education in Canada; teacher education, ethics and teacher-student relationships; and a survey of other current issues in education, such as multiculturalism, inclusion, the impact of media on youth, multiple intelligences, standardized testing, indoctrination, motivation, assessment and so on.

Course requirements

Students are expected to attend each class, actively participate in discussions and group activities, write personal narratives, post weekly on a blog/maintain a reading log, design lesson plans and develop one longer research paper for a presentation. Because this is a "W" course, or writing intensive course, a portion of instructional time will be set aside for advancing students academic literacy in the different forms of writing used in the field of education.
