NEWS IN BRIEF

PLANNING: President P.D. McTaggart-Cowan has announced the establishment of an advisory committee on long-range academic planning. Serving with Dr. McTaggart-Cowan on the committee are: Dean T.B. Bottomore and Dr. F.B. Collinge (Faculty of Arts), Dean K.E. Rieckhoff and Dr. Suso Gyax (Science), Dean A.R. MacKinnon and Dr. Leone Smith (Education), Mr. A.F.C. Hean (Board of Governors), Hon. William Hamilton (Senate) and Dr. Charles Hamilton (Director of University Affairs). Registrar D.P. Robertson is secretary. The committee will follow a five-point program: (1) Discuss the University's long-range academic goals. (2) Examine the University's academic development in relation to these goals. (3) Examine proposals for new academic programs or courses. (4) Investigate academic programs and university organization at other universities. (5) Assess the impact of the University's academic program on graduates in terms of their long-range career objectives.

GROWING: Enrolment at Simon Fraser University continues to leap ahead and another 502 students have registered at the University for the first time. Enrolment figures show that the University has 4,252 students -- 4,053 undergraduates and 199 graduates -- registered for the Spring semester. Last semester the registration was 4,234 but some 350 of these students are now taking a one-semester break from studies and 154 have withdrawn for academic reasons. Of the 4,053 undergraduates registered for this semester, 2,486 are in Arts, 805 in Science and 762 in Education.

EMPLOYMENT: Companies employing students have readily accepted Simon Fraser University's trimester system which makes undergraduates available for jobs throughout the year. W.L. Roberts, Head of the Student Placement Office, says in his first annual report: "Companies accepted the policy more readily than undergraduates and during the first semesters we had more employers' orders than we had students available." The Student Placement Office found jobs for 150 students in the 1965-1966 semester, 272 in the 1966 spring semester and 509 in the 1966 summer semester.

SYMPOSIUM. Book Saturday, February 25, for an interesting all-day symposium dealing with "The Adult on Campus." The symposium will be held in Lecture Theatre 9001 and there is a \$1.00 fee for registration and lunch. The event is being organized by the Union of Adult Students.

BASKETBALL. Simon Fraser's basketball Clansmen fly to Quebec City Friday (Feb. 10) to represent B.C. in the first Canadian Winter Games. The Clan play their first game against one of the top collegiate teams in the country, University of Calgary. Good luck to Coach John Kootnekoff and his Clan.

"NAKED ISLAND" The Communications Centre presents the current successful production of the Haney Correctional Institution Drama Group on Friday (Feb. 10) at 12.30 p.m. This SFU performance marks the first time in three years that the group has performed outside the Haney institution and the first public performance of "Naked Island" in B.C. Director of the group is Antony Holland, head of the theatre arts program at Vancouver City College, who has been working with theatre groups in correctional institutions for the last seven or eight years.

CBC CONCERT. Complimentary tickets for the concert by Canadian bass-baritone Donald Bell on Monday evening (Feb. 13) are available in the Theatre foyer office. The Bell concert, first CBC Celebrity Concert to be recorded at SFU, will feature works by Handel, Strauss, Purcell, Mozart and the Canadian composer Oskar Morawatz.
