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Discussion Topics: This course is an introduction to the academic study of world music, and will engage students in an intensive examination of musical genres from various world cultures. A particular emphasis will be placed on historical and contemporary examples of popular and folkloric music from West Africa and the Caribbean as a means of tracing the African Diaspora. Cross-cultural influences between West African music and North American jazz and popular music will also be examined.

Fundamental components of this course include substantial periods of listening to selected examples of world music - through which students will acquire critical listening skills and will develop strategies for analyzing musical genres unfamiliar to them - and the completion and comprehension of an extensive list of readings.

Grading: Mid-term Exam 25% Annotated Bibliography 15% Research Paper 30% Final Exam 30%
