NEWS IN BRIEF

100,000th VOLUME FOR LIBRARY. Simon Fraser University Library has passed an important milestone in the development of its book collection. Presentation of the 100,000th volume catalogued by the Library, World War I and the American Novel by Stanley Cooperman, was made to Professor R. J. Baker, Chairman of the Senate Library Committee, by Donald A. Baird, University Librarian. In less than two years from the opening of the University in September, 1965, the Library has established a remarkable feat in the history of academic libraries in Canada. The complete library collection will number 175,000 volumes for the start of the third year term in September 1967.

WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE. Students and faculty members from France, Scotland, Ghana, Yugoslavia, Israel, Poland and Canada will visit the campus on Thursday, July 20, as part of the six-week WUS International Seminar, for a day of lectures, seminars, swimming and a B. C. salmon dinner sponsored by Mrs. P. D. McTaggart-Cowan.

NEW RECOGNITION FOR IAIN BAXTER. Iain Baxter, one of the finalists in the Centennial Commission's open competition for artists aged 18 to 35, has just received a \$3,000 prize for his "Still Life with 8 bottles." Secretary of State Judy LaMarsh made the presentation in Ottawa on July 7. Baxter is the only artist with three works among the 35 selected from 1,900 entries across Canada for Perspective '67, now on display at the Art Gallery of Ontario in Toronto through September 30. Two other Vancouver artists, painter Michael Morris and potter Glen Lewis, whose works were selected for Perspective '67, have been teaching in the Visual Arts program organized by Baxter for the Centre for Communications and the Arts.

BASKETBALL CLINIC. The second annual Simon Fraser University Players' Basketball Clinic, open to players and coaches, will be held on Saturday, July 22, from 1 to 5 p.m. in the gymnasium. The clinic will cover pre-season conditioning and basic basketball fundamentals and show three films of the highlights from U.S. college and professional basketball games. The clinic has been organized by basketball coach John Kootnekoff.
