DEWS IN BRIEF

P.S.A. Dr. P.D. McTaggart-Cowan, President of Simon Fraser University, has announced that Professor T.B. Bottomore is relinquishing the headship of the Department of Political Science, Sociology and Anthropology at the end of December, 1967. He will be accepting an appointment as Professor of Sociology at the University of Sussex, England, in September, 1968. Prof. Bottomore will continue to hold a position as Professor of Sociology at Simon Fraser and after September, 1968, this will be a joint appointment with Sussex. Details of the arrangements between the two universities are being worked out. Dr. David G. Bettison has been appointed by the Simon Fraser Board to succeed Prof. Bottomore as head of the P.S.A. Department and he will take over on January 1, 1968. Dr. Bettison received his doctorate from Rhodes University, South Africa in 1956 and from 1961 until joining Simon Fraser was Director of the New Guinea Research Unit of the Australian National University.

LECTURE. Professor Irving L. Horowitz, who lectures on "The Cuban Ideology: Revolution within a Revolution" in 9001 on Friday, July 7, at 12.30 p.m., is Professor of Sociology at Washington University, St. Louis. He is an authority on Latin American Political affairs and a specialist on Cuba. He has written several books and numerous articles. His most recent books include Three Worlds of Development, The New Sociology and The Anarchists. He is also co-editor of the magazine, Transaction, which is the leading popular magazine on social science. He is Sociology Editor of the Oxford University Press.

GRANT. Dr. R. J. Tomanek, assistant professor in the Physical Development Centre, has received a \$2,000 grant from the National Research Council. Dr. Tomanek, who received his doctorate from the University of Iowa last year, works largely within the Department of Biological Sciences, concentrating on microscopic study of tissue change as a result of exercise. The grant will enable him to continue his studies on "the influence of chronic exercise on cardiac hypertrophy during various periods of postnatal life."

APPOINTED. Colin Smith, Associate of Professional Foundations, has been appointed to the executive of the Comparative and International Education Society of Canada. The Society, formed at recent meetings of Canada's Learned Societies in Ottawa, plans to promote comparative analyses of educational systems within Canada, contribute to better overall planning in education, co-operate with University and government aid programs to developing countries and share in programs which bring foreign students to Canada. First president of the society is Prof. Joseph Katz of the UBC Faculty of Education.
