NEWS IN BRIEF

GRANTS. Dr. Gary B. Rush, of the Department of Political Science, Sociology and Anthropology, has received a \$5,000 grant from the newly organized Educational The grant will assist Dr. Rush in his North Vancouver Research Institute of B. C. Adolescent Society study.

Prof. N. S. Popkin, also of the PSA Department, has been awarded a Canada Council Research Grant of \$1,260 in support of a continuing program of research on the political dynamics of the Republic of Panama and of the foreign relations of Panama. Also awarded to Professor N.S. Popkin from the President's Research Grants Committee is a grant for \$402 for "Preliminary Survey of Christian Democratic Movements in the Dominican Republic, Columbia and Venezuela.

WESTERN ASSOCIATION OF ART MUSEUMS -- Seventy delegates to the Western Association of Art Museums conference in Vancouver and Victoria September 20-23 will be holding meetings on the Simon Fraser University campus Friday, September 22. They will be meeting in AQ. 3159 9. 30-10. 30 a.m. and in AQ. 3149 from 10. 30-11. 30 a.m. The delegates represent art museums from B. C. to the Mexican border and as far east as Wisconsin. They will meet with members of the Centre for Communications and the Arts and tour the University.

WINNER. Gordon M. Summers, 26-year-old honors geography student, has won the Canadian Region Scholarship of the Soil Conservation Society of America. The Gildea Scholarship in Conservation, valued at \$500, is awarded on the basis of need and scholastic achievement to students enrolled in natural resource conservation curricula. The Society annually names one scholarship winner in each of its nine regions in the United States and Canada. Summers was co-founder of the Simon Fraser Student Geographical Society.

INDIAN MUSIC. Noted musicologist Dr. Ida Halpern, an Associate of the Communications Centre, has a two-record set entitled "Indian Music of the Pacific Northwest Coast" soon to go on sale at local stores. Dr. Halpern spent many years collecting and recording the music of B. C. Indians. The records are being put out by Folkway Records.

INTRAMURAL. Deadline for entry of intramural teams in soccer, waterpolo and girls' volleyball is Tuesday, September 19. Entries (or any persons interested in participating in the intramural program) should go to Mrs. Marg Savage or Jim Young in the Department of Athletics.

TOURS. The Student Guide Service will continue to provide guided tours for visitors at weekends and on public holidays during the fall semester. Tours leave the University entrance every hour, at half-past the hour, from 10.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. This is a free service for the public. During the summer it is estimated nearly 2,000 visitors a week were taken on guided tours. Guided public tours on weekdays have now been cancelled.
