Leon & Thea Koerner Foundation Lecture in Experimental Science

The Department of Biological Sciences at Simon Fraser University has announced that Professor F. C. Steward, F.R.S., Cornell University, Ithaca, will deliver a lecture on the series under The Leon & Thea Koerner Foundation Lectures in Experimental Science at Simon Fraser University.

The lecture entitled "Growth and Organized Development of Cultured Cells" will take place on Thursday, March 31, at 8.15 p.m., in Auditorium C-9000 in the Science Complex.

Professor Steward is Director of the Laboratory for Cell Physiology, Growth and Development at Cornell University. He is an international authority on problems of cell differentiation. In particular, he has been able to stimulate single cells of carrot roots kept in tissue culture to grow into new seed producing plants. (Released to the Press: March 30)

Dr. Robertson is Head of the Department of Social and Economic Research at the University of Glasgow, Scotland, and is presently Visiting Professor at the University of California. He is a specialist in the field of Scottish regional economics and in the field of industrial relations.

#### THE CHANCELLOR SHRUM GOLD MEDAL

Dr. Leon Koerner has made possible an award of a gold medal and \$500.00 in May of each year to an outstanding student in any Faculty at Simon Fraser University who has completed the requirements for the Bachelor's degree during the preceding Summer, Fall or Spring semester. The medal is named in honour of Chancellor Gordon Merritt Shrum.

The award shall be made to the student who has maintained a high scholastic standing during no fewer than six semesters at Simon Fraser University and who by example and by participation in extra-curricular activities has shown outstanding qualities of character and unselfish devotion to Simon Fraser University.

The award shall be made upon recommendation of the Scholarship Committee after consultation with members of the Faculty and representatives of the student body.

"I know that this award will provide an inspiration to our outstanding students and I should like to say how deeply appreciative I am of this recognition by Dr. Koerner, one of the greatest benefactors of higher education in British Columbia," said Chancellor Gordon Shrum.

#### Department of Psychology Announcement

Dr. Elinor Ames of the Department of Psychology has been awarded a research grant of \$3,000 from the National Research Council for "Developmental studies of stimulus complexity and familiarity as determinants of attention in infants." Dr. Ames has been investigating infant perceptual development for the past four years with a view to determining infant preferences for visual stimuli. The present study is part of a larger continuing project aimed at the collection of data basic to infant development.
