Discussion Topics: This course will examine theoretical bases of and practical orientations to international and intercultural education. We will explore theories and ideas on contemporary global and local aspects of culture, identity, issues of power and privilege and how they construct difference and dominant/minority group relations. Using examples from media and popular culture, we will critically analyze how notions of culture, the local and the global are constructed and how they inform and influence learning and schooling in a variety of settings. Topics will include (and are not limited to) culture and identity, cultural difference, privilege, equity and equity programs, immigrants and new comers, global issues including international development, study abroad and international student issues. From the understanding gained from these explorations, we will discuss how they may inform the design of inclusive and respectful classrooms and promote respectful communities.

The course will comprise a range of learning experiences for students including in-class group activities, mini-lectures, small group and whole-class discussions, videos and visual media, individual study including reflective and critical engagement with readings. Please note that the writing and reading workload is reflective of a 4 credit, upper level Education course.

The course will function as a forum to discuss intercultural and international issues in education as it relates to course participants and the wider community, leading to personal growth, and a nuanced, complex and diverse understanding of these ideas in education.
