NEWS IN BRIEF

ROBERT MCKENZIE HERE. Prof. Robert McKenzie, writer and broadcaster on British politics who lectures here Thursday (see "This Week's Events"), was born in Vancouver and graduated from UBC. He has lived in England for more than 20 years and is Professor of Sociology at the London School of Economics and Political Science. His book "British Political Parties" is regarded as a classic reference work for all students of British politics.

SFU-UBC-ARTS. Simon Fraser people participate in the Festival of Contemporary Arts at UBC. A one-man show by Michael Morris, who is teaching painting here, will be on display in the Fine Arts Gallery. Mr. Morris leads a tour of the exhibition at 12.30 p. m. Wednesday, February 1. Films by Al Sens and Dan Singer are in a program of experimental films on the same day at 3.30 p. m. in Angus 104. Robin Blaser reads his poetry in the Poet's Market at 12.30 p. m. Thursday, February 2, 2nd floor, Buchanan Building, and a work by Jack Behrens will be performed at 12.30 p. m. Monday, February 6 in Buchanan 106.

PRESIDENT ELECTED. President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan has been elected a Fellow of the American Meteorological Society in recognition of his "outstanding contributions to the science of meteorology over a substantial period of years." Dr. McTaggart-Cowan spent 26 years in meteorology before his appointment to Simon Fraser in 1964.
