Hopps, director of the Pasadena Art Museum, was with Edward Kienholz originator of the Ferus Art Gallery, one of the leading Los Angeles art galleries. He organized and selected the U.S. entries for the Sao Paulo exhibit in 1965, and has organized many other major exhibitions including those of works by Marcel DuChamps, Jasper Johns, Joseph Cornell and Frank Stella.

\$30,000 Grant for Education Faculty

A \$30,000 grant from the Donner Canadian Foundation will be used to support an Education Faculty project to explore "information movement" between B. C. schools and universities.

The project calls for a mobile study van, equipped with the latest audio-visual aids, to carry informational resources from Simon Fraser to the Schools and to collect research data which can be fed back to the University.

Dr. A. R. MacKinnon, Dean of Education, says: "The project is concerned primarily with reducing the time lag in information movement between schools and universities. In making its grant, the Donner Foundation recognized in the new concept of teacher education at Simon Fraser a possible way of opening up channels of communication between educational institutions."

Boxing Club Formed

Simon Fraser now has its own boxing club -- the Tartan Terrors. The club already boasts 35 members.

Brian Penny, who is coaching, had several years experience with the Brighton Boxing Club in England. He says:

"We will not be challenging other universities for some time, but the Tartan Terrors will be holding their own Simon Fraser tournaments. We have several promising boxers."

CUSO selects, trains and sends qualified Canadian volunteers for two-year service in the developing countries of Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean. There are 570 CUSO volunteers in 35 countries.
